Minister's Letter

Say 'November' and the picture that often springs to mind is grey, damp weather and fog. To my children it conjured up a month with no school holidays. Due to a quirk of the English language 'November' rhymes with 'remember', and it is usually a month when people do 'remember'.

It begins with All Saints (or All Hallows, which gives us 'Hallowe'en' the night before), a time when many Christians recall those who have gone before in the faith, the great and the good, the awkward and the 'fruitcakes' (the church is meant to be inclusive for everyone!), and also All Souls, a time not only to remember close family and friends who are sorely missed, but also God's promises for them through Jesus.



Towards the middle of the month we have Remembrance Day, remembering the pain and sacrifice accepted by so many in the World Wars and other conflicts, that we might live in freedom, and reflecting too on conflicts, tensions

and potential trouble in so many places today.

At the end of the month is St Andrew's Day, remembering Jesus' first disciple, the first to bring someone else (his brother Peter) to him, and who served him so faithfully and quietly. It is usually a time to think of Scotland and the Scots diaspora, but we can also recall others who look to him as their national saint – like Ukraine and Russia, and pray for peace. Maybe on that day we should remind ourselves of the words of Hymn 339 in the hymnbook:

So may we who prize his memory honour Christ in our own day, bearing witness to our neighbours, living what we pray and sing.



We have about a dozen children each week with a mixture of Mums, Dads, grandparents and other grown-ups. It happens, as you know, on Thursday mornings from 9.45 to 11.45 but families come and go as suits them. There's a snack time after 10.15 when the children are encouraged to sit at low tables (if they are able!) and hot drinks and snacks are also provided for the grown-ups.


Later, everyone is encouraged to help put the toys away and about 11.30 there's a short singing-circle time, finishing with The Grand Old Duke of York which is a great favourite.

The cost is £2 per week, plus £1 for additional children. We are insured for under 5s but most children come until they are 3 and old enough to go to nursery.



CHILD OR ADULT? MILK OR SOLID FOOD?

The famous passages in I *Corinthians* 13: 11-12 and *Hebrews* 5: 12-14 (read and check them for yourself!) remind and encourage us that we as Christians should be seeking to explore and deepen our faith individually and with each other in such a way as to grow in Christian maturity.



The Church of Scotland has now launched a new online learning portal called Church of Scotland Learning that offers wide а range of exercises, courses and suitable programmes for individuals, small groups and larger groups. The portal can

be easily accessed via the Church of Scotland Website > Resources > Church of Scotland Learning.

Foodbank Update

The congregation's support of St Gregory's Food bank continues. Evidence in their recent Newsletter lays bear that we are contributing to meet a the need that

is growing.

A depressing record was set in the week of the 11th of September 2023, with 287 bags given out. This figure is almost double the

demand of 2021. To add to this, the cost per bag has now risen to £10.50. This means that for the first time ever, the food bank's weekly cost reached £3,000.

The need for help is seen as persisting into the future, SO during the last few months there has been a focus on volunteer development. Manv of the volunteers now hold food hygiene qualifications. In addition to this, they are in the midst of setting up new shelving and under-table storage. Such is the need, they now have five fridges and five freezers which is helping to keep pace with demand.

The food bank is staffed entirely by a dedicated team of volunteers which means there are no staffing costs.

STEDFAST

REMEMBRANCE 2023

The memorial to the members of this congregation who lost their lives serving in the forces in the Second World War faces the congregation throughout every service, as it has done since it was unveiled in 1949.

On Remembrance Sunday it gets extra attention. A small vase is attached to the wall just under it, donated by a member who was touched that one individual no longer had family here. This suggest that flowers from the others' relatives were laid in front.

One of the memorialised, Miller Dunlop, died when the plane he piloted on a bombing raid over France was shot down. He is buried in the graveyard of the small town of Ecorcei.

A local teacher produced a study of those in the military graves. His conclusion is relevant to all

the names on the St John's-Renfield memorials, including those to the Great War,

All these young men, coming from a variety of

backgrounds, had a family, a fiancée, friends.

They had also a career and they thought about what

they would do after the war, once peace had returned.

David Hutchison, lawyer

Britain was different from the other combatants in having no peacetime conscription. When war broke out, for example in France, vast numbers of men headed for their regiment. On



reaching manhood they had spent up to three years in the forces, followed by years in the reserve, with several weeks very year in camp having their skills refreshed.

In Britain, when both wars broke out, a fighting force

had to be created from scratch, overwhelmingly from men who had never had the desire to be soldiers.

In this sense, the names we see in front of us are all civilians.

We have the responsibility of not forgetting the sacrifice made by all these men and to know how to preserve this peace, paid for so dearly.




