Pastoral Letter

The word that we hear most often these days is, probably, crisis. Cost living crisis, energy crisis, healthcare staffing crisis, Ukraine crisis, and so forth; there are so many crises that it is hard to tell which one affects us more. To live in our current context, we cannot simply ignore them. Instead, we need to see what tools we have to cope with them.

The Bible's authors, interestingly, do not use the word crisis in their writings, but, of course, it does not mean that there were no crises in the biblical times. On the contrary, the whole narrative is built on how the people of God ended up in different crises and how God used these crises to teach them some significant lessons and, more importantly, how he rescued his people from those crises. The words that are used to indicate a crisis in the Scriptures reflect the way that people deal with their crises. Thus, in the Bible, instead of crisis, we find words like trial or temptation. These terms highlight that God was testing them. Nowadays, we have other ways to express God's involvement in our times of uncertainty and difficulty. Instead of saying that God is testing us or even punishing us, we can say that we can learn from these experiences, develop more sophisticated strategies to cope with them, and grow and flourish as we respond to them.

In the Bible, the emphasis is on the attitude that we should have in times of trouble. 'Do not worry,' 'do not be anxious,' or 'do not fear,' are examples of expressions frequently used to tell us how to live in a period of crisis. For instance, Jesus' core message to those living in crisis is: 'do not worry.' Faith, trust, patience, and hope are the main fundamental tools we have to overcome adversity. Jesus' life was a life of struggles, however, the strength he showed throughout his life was precisely what made his message so vivid and convincing to his audience.

When facing a crisis, people react differently. Some people become anxious or even despair. Others become angry and upset. Still others ask for or demand solutions. And, finally, there are those who try to adapt to the new situation, looking for alternatives or trying to see opportunities or lessons to learn from the crisis. The best way to react to a crisis is given by Jesus Christ. He is a teacher and example of how to deal with phases of uncertainty and confusion rather than a distant saviour or redeemer.

Bringing this reflection to us, in our current context, I would say that we need to look at what is happening around us with faith that God is not absent from our suffering, with trust that he gives us wisdom and strength to overcome all challenges, and with hope that the future will be bright and full of opportunities to grow and flourish. And this message is true to each of us in our personal struggles, but also true for St. John's Renfield as a whole. We are facing a period of uncertainty, knowing that change would be necessary and inevitable, and we do not even know how to prepare for it as it is not clear yet what is going to happen. But in times like the one that we are living in is good to go back to the basics: 'do not worry about tomorrow.'



The Bonanza is back!!



I'm also able to meet with individuals and groups, either in person or online, to provide information about the support which is available to carers and how to access this.







If you know any children that would be interested in joining our merry Sunday gang, please let us know! Always happy to see some new faces.


Times Past

June 1909 – 250 children by train to Cardross

Jordanhill U. F. Church Sabbath School children, to the number of 250, had an enjoyable picnic on Saturday afternoon, when they were taken per North British Railway Co from Great Western Road Station to Cardross.

The Station remains familiar to us as 'GWR'. The rails are no more. However, platforms can still be seen at the rear of the building.




