

Minister's Letter

Like many churches, in St John's-Renfield we will be marking Harvest during the month of October. It is an opportunity to

give thanks to God for the food we have and the people involved in the process of bringing it to our table. It is also a time to think about issues relating to food: hunger and its causes, both on our doorstep and around the world; the sustainability of food production, and the carbon footprint of some of our food; the impact of the climate emergency on food production, and what that means for food producers; what producers are paid, and the conditions in which they work.

I haven't yet come across anyone in St John's Renfield who is directly involved in the production, distribution or processing of food, but I have found many who have skills and experience in a wide variety of areas of life. It is a long time since Scotland/Britain had an entirely subsistence economy, so for a very long time people have been dependent on others for providing goods and services that are essential, or important for life.

In a climate like ours we need clothes, and somewhere warm and dry to live. We believe everyone should have access to clean water, safe sanitation, education, medical and social care. We need people like the police and armed forces to ensure we can go about our lives safely; fire and rescue staff to be there for emergencies; professional people like lawyers, bankers and accountants to give advice and ensure that our non-subsistence economy operates effectively; government and local

government staff etc etc (If your particular career or job isn't mentioned, don't worry, you are still important!).

Though we may focus on fruit and vegetables, Harvest can also be a time to remember how much our lives depend upon other people, their skills and specialisms — even before we start thinking of things that provide leisure and pleasure. We can give thanks to God for the work of so many people, and the helpful way they do it (OK, there is always someone who is awkward!) But there can be all sorts of issues to think about relating to these jobs too: some relating to sustainability and impact on the environment, some to the conditions in which they work (e.g. in garment production overseas), or the remuneration they receive. On our own we may not have answers, or be able to do much, but working with others, perhaps supporting campaigns led by the likes of Christian Aid, we can make a difference, and work towards the kind of world God would like to see.

The Lodging House Mission has invited Churches and groups to join in a 'Knit Together Exhibition' of blankets made of knitted squares to be held at the Christmas Carol Service on 13th December to raise awareness of homelessness. They hope that the exhibition will represent ways we as individuals are 'knit together' into community. The single bed size blankets will be a powerful representation of the many individuals across the City of Glasgow who live in need of security and warmth. The blankets will be used in a number of ways.

The Craft Group will be busy making squares and would like to welcome anyone who enjoys knitting to join us. We can collect the squares or they can be handed in at Church. Date of




delivery to LHM is 1st December. The squares should be 40 stitches of 70 rows (or however many rows make a square) knitted in double knitting wool with 4mm (or Number 8 in old money) needles. There is no need to match colours as a wonderful hotchpotch will look good! 
