Minister's Letter

Primary 1 or 2 child to School Chaplain: 'I know what Easter is all about. It's when the Easter Bunny was born. My Gran told me.' Chaplain then has to do a diplomatic manoeuvre telling small child that the church celebrates something else at Easter, while trying not to shatter the child's faith in Gran's infallibility (even while he thinks, 'Your Gran told you a load of rubbish!')



Many people seem to find it easier to believe in the Easter Bunny than in the Risen Jesus, but for those of us who do believe in Jesus, and trust in the Easter message, it gives us a completely different perspective on life.

When we lose someone close, or know that we are approaching the end of our time on earth, Jesus' promise that there is a life beyond this one, where we will be forever with him, and where there is no more pain or hurt, is a comfort and consolation.

When we look at the world around us — whether it's politics, armed conflict, increasing polarisation of views, the impact of climate change, misuse of new technology or whatever — it would be so easy to feel despair and give up hope of a better, safer world for generations to come. But the Easter message speaks of hope, of assurance, that God is concerned about our world, and that in the end Truth, Love, Justice and God's other values will have the last word.

Easter gives us hope. Easter gives us life. But it is not just about life beyond this one. Assured that there is a God who cares, who acts,

who has demonstrated that he and his values will have the last word, our life in this world can take on a new quality and outlook. Easter hope doesn't promise us an easy life, or a life packed with fun and comfort. In fact, it can be the complete opposite – we feel compelled to be involved in charity, community or church work which can be tiring, and sometimes thankless. But Easter gives us a new outlook on life, a conviction that it is worth striving to bring change, and the power of God's Spirit is with us to keep us going, and make us have an impact on the world around us.


MESSY CHURCH

2023 A good Year?

Thanks, in no small measure to your continuing generosity and two legacies received into the General Account, last year we had a surplus of £12,001.

Ordinary income rose by 2.3% while interest received and Sunday coffee increased by 20%. However, legacies totalling £10,300 raised our income by almost £14,000 to £159,460.

Expenditure rose by £3,300 but that masks some wide variations. Being vacant and without a locum has saved us just over £11,000 but we have spent that money on the property and electrical work in particular. We also spent money on the heating and this work is ongoing as well.

We have also been fortunate that our gas and electricity contracts were dated before the steep rises in late 2022 but alas these are now having to be renewed going forward.

During the year we received a third legacy but this was placed directly into the fund set up to pay for refurbishing the toilets and upgrading the Brotherton Hall. After paying some architects' fees we now have almost £68,000 in the Project Fund.

More details and a look into the future will be provided at the Stated Annual Meeting on Sunday 21st. April after morning service when we will consider the future financial needs of St John's-Renfield.

A couple of notes from the accounts are also shown in the Beacon which will not be directly reported on but may be of interest and confirming our generosity as a congregation and community.

We were able to send an extra £1,000 to the Foodbank in December over and above the £350 per month we normally give to help those families in real need over the Christmas period.

Gift Aid will also be able to be claimed direct by the charities on some of the donations listed above.

Donations in kind were also made during the year to St. Gregory's Foodbank, the Lodging House Mission and Christmas gifts for children through Glasgow, the Caring City.




