

## **Minister's Letter**

What is your earliest memory? Mine is going down a slide into a swimming pool. My parents told me that it must have been in Troon, when I was 12 months old. I suspect that having such a clear picture in my head it must have felt fairly traumatic at the time. Sometimes it is hard to decide what we actually remember, and what our minds have pieced together from stories that we have been told, and photographs that we have seen.

So much of our early life – at home, at school, on holiday – has now slipped from our memories. There may be some times we are glad that we cannot remember, but there are other little kernels tucked away that can be brought back to mind given the right trigger. One example for me was after I became a minister in Greenock and saw some published old photos of the harbour, and suddenly thought 'I remember that' from when we went through it in the car going to the coast many years before.

It is pure coincidence, but as the year draws towards its close, the nights become darker (and sometimes the days!), the weather turns colder and more miserable, and we want to recall the longer, sunnier, warmer days of summer, the month of November gives us trigger points to remember people and situations we might not otherwise think about.

The month begins with All Saints, encouraging us to remember and give thanks for people who have been part of our journey of faith, but who have now passed into the closer presence of God — ministers, Sunday School teachers, elders, friends, the lady who sat in the row in front etc.

We have Remembrance Sunday to help us to remember the pain and suffering so many went through to give us our freedom, to remind us that so many of the rights and privileges we take for granted came at great cost, that many lived with — still live with — physical and mental pain and hardship, to challenge us to think about difficult issues associated with our heritage, our national friendships and opponents, and questions about war and peace.

We have St Andrew's Day. Andrew never visited Scotland. He may well never have heard of the Atlantic coast of Europe, let alone islands offshore. But he was adopted as 'patron' of Scotland and has long been linked with this land. St Andrew's Day gives us an opportunity to think about this country, the people who live here, and the issues that they face. Andrew was a faithful follower of Jesus, and as such his 'Day' challenges us, as followers of Jesus too, to consider carefully what we can do to help to build God's Kingdom here.

# SJR Walking Group – expect the unexpected!

The September outing of the walking group had a few pleasant but unexpected twists! Target destination was the new Govan-Partick pedestrian bridge followed by some exploration of Govan. Led by John McFadyen, a group of 12 made the bridge



crossing, which is quite a spectacular sight and was pleasantly busy with pedestrians and cyclists. The bridge, which opened on 6<sup>th</sup> September, features two pillars from the old Govan Ferry ramp at the Govan end and opens on to a modern plaza surrounded by new flats in Water Row.



Coming across a riverside path heading west from the end of the bridge, we took this route direct to Govan Old Church. As we were coincidentally walking on Doors Open weekend, this presented the opportunity to take advantage of a tour of their famous collection of early medieval carved stones. The Viking hogback stones are particularly

Next stop was a brief visit to Fairfield Heritage, a community museum dedicated to telling the story of Govan's outstanding role in world shipbuilding and housed in the former headquarters of the Fairfield Shipbuilding & Engineering Company Ltd. The man on the door was delighted to add 12 to his head count for the day, and a quick look at the displays had many promising to return soon for a proper visit. <a href="https://www.fairfieldgovan.co.uk/">https://www.fairfieldgovan.co.uk/</a>



Walking through the adjacent Elder Park, we looked at several monuments linked to the local shipbuilding history, including one to the 26 sailors and 6 Fairfield's workers who perished during the sinking of submarine K13 during sea trials in the Gareloch in 1917.

Next stop was Elder Park Library, where John had promised 'posh loos'! The building itself is stunning with lots of original interior features, despite offering the services of a modern library. While waiting on group members using the loos (I was expecting 'historic posh', but they are modern and, unusually, communal!), the group were asked if they wanted to join a community soup lunch! This was an unexpected treat, where we tucked into bread and homemade vegetable soup, made with veg grown in a community growing space just around the corner. The group, Urban Roots, host a soup lunch every Saturday, with a community meal once a month, all provided free of charge.

Having started the walk by crossing OVER the Clyde, we ended by crossing back UNDER the river. Not many of the group had previously walked through the pedestrian part of the Clyde Tunnel, which

is divided into a walking path and a cycleway. The rumble of the nearby traffic and air extractors is constant and it seems a considerably longer journey by foot, with the changing gradient also much more noticeable than when in the car!

Thanks to John McFadyen for leading another enjoyable outing. Watch the intimations for news of another walk before we hang up our rucksacks for the winter - this will be dependent on how the weather pans out over the coming weeks.

## A Tribute to Bryan and Margaret Whitty

Bryan and his wife Margaret were supporters of the Centre for the Rehabilitation of the Paralysed (CRP) in Bangladesh and of the Valerie Taylor Trust for more than 50 years.

In 1969, Bryan was the anaesthetist at the Chandraghona Mission Hospital, near Chittagong. It was here that he and Margaret welcomed Valerie Taylor to work as a physiotherapist. He returned to

Glasgow in 1973 where he worked as a GP for many years.

In 2004 he visited CRP and was impressed by what he saw and in 2009, he became a trustee of the recently formed Valerie Taylor Trust.

Bryan and Margaret were energetic and imaginative fundraisers, organising annual stalls at their Church and the 'Essential Gift

Scheme' run by Elizabeth Arthur. Fundraising involved the whole family, Bryan, Margaret, their children (and grandchildren), their niece Yvonne and their nephew Alistair. All contributed their



gifts and skills to fundraising events, often sponsored by their friends. Since Bryan's death in 2023, his family has created a JustGiving page as a Memorial Fund for him which has so far raised £1,800.

CRP are developing a 'Standing Wheelchair', a wheelchair which can support the user into a standing position, providing pressure relief and many other benefits. Bryan's Memorial Fund will be used to make several more of these Standing Wheelchairs.

Bryan was a lovely man and great supporter and we honour his memory.

## Safeguarding in the Church of Scotland Protecting children and adults at risk

Safeguarding is about preventing harm and abuse and making a timely and appropriate response if it occurs. We have a duty to Ensure a Safe Church for All.

This means protecting children and adults at risk.

#### Volunteers and the Data Cleanse Project

From April 2025 it will be unlawful for an organisation, such as the Church of Scotland, registered with Disclosure Scotland to hold 'an interest' in a volunteer/worker's PVG Scheme membership if that volunteer/worker is *not actively* carrying out regulated work.

This is about legal information sharing and people's rights to privacy. If we keep your name on the Safeguarding Congregational Roll, it means that Disclosure Scotland or Police Scotland might give the Safeguarding Service information about you that they shouldn't.

To comply with this Act, we need to remove the names of volunteers from the Roll if these people are *no longer actively* carrying out regulated work.

We are not allowed to keep people on the Roll 'just in case'.

We will be contacting those volunteers involved in the near future. Volunteering is such an important part of Church life and the work of all volunteers is valued and appreciated so if your name has to be removed from the Roll, it is purely to comply with the law.

#### **Volunteers Safeguarding Training**

For those volunteers who continue to carry out *active* regulated work and still require to update their Safeguarding Training, the list of courses sent to you in September is still valid. Please get in touch with either of us to book a place on any of these courses.

Remember, if you are worried or have concerns about any Safeguarding matter, or suspect that harm or abuse is taking place, you should contact Moira Eaglesham or Marion Dowling as soon as possible. (Our contact numbers can be found on posters at various points throughout the Church buildings.) If the issue is urgent or immediate, contact Police Scotland or Social Work.




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
