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### **Minister's Letter**

A few years ago, at a school Easter service, a wee boy in P2 or 3 told me that he knew what Easter was all about, 'It's the Easter Bunny's Birthday — my Granny told me.' You can't tell a wee one of about 6 or 7 that his Granny was talking rubbish, so I simply said something like, 'Well in church we celebrate something else.'



Around this time of the year (and certainly once retailers have finished with 'Mother's Day') the word 'Easter' starts to be bandied about a lot - usually in conjunction with chocolate, eggs, sweets, special holiday food, holiday breaks etc. We might even hear some commentators pointing out that the word 'Easter' is derived from a pagan Germanic Spring goddess, Eostre. Anglo-Saxons who became Christians used that name for their Spring-time celebration of the resurrection of Jesus, but the story of Easter most certainly does not come from a Germanic pagan myth. The church had been celebrating the resurrection of Jesus for nearly six centuries before the Anglo-Saxons began to adopt the Christian faith.

In the earliest days of the church its members were all, and then primarily, Jewish by background and beliefs. To them Jesus was the fulfilment of God's promises through the Law and the Prophets, so it was natural for them to celebrate the Jewish festivals like Passover – but understanding God's salvation from slavery and call to be his holy people in a new way. Even though the church membership gradually became more 'Gentile' by background, there do not initially seem to have been any 'festivals', 'seasons' nor a liturgical year (which is why some of the more strict Reformed traditions do not celebrate Christmas or Easter). Rather the church celebrated the

birth, life, death, resurrection, ascension of Jesus and the coming of the Spirit each Sunday!

By the Second Century the church seems to have developed a special Spring weekend - for fasting, reflection and celebrating Baptism and Communion - linked to the Jewish festival of Passover. It was the forerunner of Good Friday and Easter Day. They called it 'Pascha', a word derived via Aramaic (Jesus' native tongue) from the Hebrew word for the Passover Festival (Pesach). Many modern European languages use a word derived from Pascha (eg French Paques) for the day we call 'Easter Day'. In Northern England (at least when I was young) dyed hard-boiled eggs prepared for Easter Day were sometimes referred to a 'pace-eggs' or 'paste-eggs' - terms derived from that same word 'Pascha'.

Whatever word(s) we use to describe that special Spring weekend, however much advertisers, retailers etc seem to have commandeered the word(s) to sell merchandise and experiences, for us the core importance is not just what happened



a long time ago, but that Jesus is alive now. He is with us each day. He demonstrated that God is active and cares about his world, that God has shared in the suffering of the world, and promises us that in the end the way of goodness, truth and love will have the last word. That's much more exciting and long-lasting than a chocolate egg or a holiday weekend!

Happy Easter/Pascha/whatever!

### **Vacancy Update**

As reported in the March Beacon, we have been given permission to begin the process of seeking to call a Minister. Assistant Session Clerk Susan Finnigan and others recently completed and submitted a Vacancy Schedule to the satisfaction of the Church of Scotland's Faith Action Team and we have been advised that, unless any member of our church or of Presbytery lodges an objection by Saturday 29 March 2025, our congregation can take the next steps towards calling.

Rollkeeper Jim Tassell will make our sure our Electoral Roll is up to date; a member of Presbytery's Property Committee will inspect the manse; and a member of Presbytery's Vacancy Advisory Committee will meet with the Kirk Session (time to be agreed).

Updating our Parish Profile is another job to be done before we advertise our vacancy. The Profile will give potential candidates an overview of the life and work of our church, and will reflect the congregation's views about what we're looking for in our next Minister, and what s/he can expect from us. Please share your views by completing a short survey. Please remember St John's-Renfield is your church and your opinion counts. 

The following extract is from a fantastic part of our Youth Service

### The Past and the Present - part 1

#### **BB READER 1**

Wow, who would have thought that on 30<sup>th</sup> March 2025, the 5<sup>th</sup> Glasgow would be celebrating an incredible milestone, its 140<sup>th</sup> birthday! It's amazing to think where the Company has come from, how it started all those years ago, what we get up to nowadays, and to think about what the future holds.

#### **GUIDE READER 1**

What an amazing achievement, and the 25<sup>th</sup> Glasgow Guide Company has also been around for a considerable number of years - 94 years to be precise! Only 6 years to go until our centenary! So tell me, how did the 5<sup>th</sup> Glasgow BB start all those years ago?

#### **BB READER 2**

Well, it was on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1885, some 18 months after the founding of the 1<sup>st</sup> Glasgow Boys' Brigade at Woodside Hall, that the 5<sup>th</sup> started. The Company has forever been associated with St John's Renfield and its predeceasing churches. At its birth, the 5<sup>th</sup> was connected to Renfield Free Church and met on Thursday evenings in the Mission Hall at 199 Cowcaddens under the captaincy of Mr J Carfrae Alston – who also had the distinction of being the very first Boys' Brigade President and held that position for 24 years. Out of interest, when did the 25<sup>th</sup> Glasgow Guides start?

#### **GUIDES READER 2**

Well, way back in 1910, Lord Baden Powell, who started the Scout movement, asked his sister Agnes Baden Powell to formally start the Girl Guides. When Lord Baden Powell died, he requested that his wife Olave took over the Girl Guides.

The 25<sup>th</sup> Glasgow Guide Company started on 15<sup>th</sup> July 1931. The movement thankfully managed to continue through World War 2, and grew in strength from there on. What sort of activities did the boys do in the early years?

#### **BB READER 1**

Well, drill and discipline were favourites along with Physical Training. Camping was also a well-loved activity and, did you know, that the 5<sup>th</sup> Glasgow was one of the pioneers of BB camping. 1913 was one of our first camps at Kilchattan Bay on the isle of Bute. What did the Guides do in the early days?

#### **GUIDES READER 1**

Girl Guides used to love marching, singing campfire songs, and doing various interest badges such as Firefighter, First Aid, Childminding, Knitting, and Sewing. So how did the 5<sup>th</sup> Glasgow end up here in St John's Renfield?

#### **BB READER 2**

Well, in 1931, after an amalgamation of two churches - St John's Free Church and Renfield Free Church — which created St John's Renfield U.F. Church in 1926 - this present church building in Beaconsfield Road was opened and the 5th Glasgow moved into their new headquarters. Have your Guides been here at St John's since you started?

#### **GUIDE READER 2**

Yes, for 94 years the 25<sup>th</sup> Glasgow Guide Company have been holding our weekly meetings in St John's Renfield. It's amazing to think of all the

girls that must have passed through these doors as Guides over all that time.

I want to know what's changed with the BB over the years, can you let me know?

### The Past and the Present – part 2

#### **BB READER 1**

Well, back in the days after the Second World War, the 5<sup>th</sup>, in common with other Companies, struggled for Boys and had fewer officers. 13 exmembers lost their lives in service for their country during this war. However, the Company began to grow again with camping and the bugle band being central to the BB activities, and the Company held their annual camps both in the UK and abroad down the years. What sort of stuff did the Guides get up to after the War years?

#### **GUIDE READER 2**

During the 1950's & 1960's Our Chalet in Switzerland was opened then Our Cabana in Mexico and Sangam in India were opened. Our Guides have been to Switzerland twice over the years.

In 2014 we went to County Camp with over 200 Guides at Gartocharn. The weather was terrible and on the Saturday all the tents blew down and we had to sleep in the Brownie House. Poor Eileen had to sleep in the kitchen as there was so many sleeping on the Brownie House floor.

#### **BB READER 2**

Well, one important and notable fact that you might not know, is that the 5<sup>th</sup> Glasgow occupied a camp site in Glen Ashdale on the isle of Arran over a number of years, and the trigonometrical point at the top of Goatfell was erected courtesy of the 5<sup>th</sup>.

#### **GUIDE READER 1**

Nowadays our Guides get up to all sorts of fun activities such as Sleepovers at Flipout and Glasgow Science Centre, lots of camps to Gartocharn and Auchengillan. Do the BB still do all that boring marching around, or have you come into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century?

#### **BB READER 1**

I'll have you know that we are quite good at Drill thank you very much. But that's only a very small part of what we do. We still enjoy weekend camps at Tignabruaich, although not so much getting bitten by midges, and we do lots of great events such as canoeing, mountain biking, climbing, racing simulators, skateboarding, wakeboarding, not to mention all the games and skills that we do and learn on a Friday night. What do you guys get up to these days?

#### **GUIDE READER 2**

Our Interest badges cover 6 sections which include Know Myself, Be Well, Have Adventure, Take Action and Skills for the Future. So what do you think the future holds?

#### **BB READER 2**

Well, who would have thought back in 1885 that the 5<sup>th</sup> Glasgow Company, and the Boys' Brigade movement as a whole, would be alive and kicking well into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Many things have changed over those 140 years but, in a funny way, many things have stayed the same. You see it's all about having fun with your friends, while learning and developing skills that you can take forward as young men. I mean, the spirit of camaraderie and teamwork, and the great BB ethos still lives on in the 5<sup>th</sup> Glasgow today. That's why we still come. What do you reckon the Guides will be like in the future?

#### **GUIDE READER 1**

We think the future of Girl Guiding should consist of learning skills that set us up for life and provide us with the leadership abilities which we can use as we move into adulthood. In other words, help us to grow into well rounded and responsible citizens.

### Notes on the Accounts – Year ended 31 December 2024

#### **General Account**

The General Account shows an excess of income over expenditure of £18,627. Overall ordinary income increased by £9,142 to £168,602. The main items showed offerings down by £3,819 to £102,835 Gift Aid recovery up by £523 to £25,744. There was one legacy of £20,000 a grant £3,009 and £400 from our Boys' Brigade Company received during the year.

General Account expenditure increased by £2,516 during the year to £149,975. The main changes were an increase in salary costs and pulpit supply of £1,898 a reduction of £4,898 in property repair costs to £17,485. Heating and lighting increased by £4,991, Insurance by £1,046 and upkeep of grounds by £1,004. Equipment maintenance reduced by £1,211. All other costs fluctuated by no more than £1,000 each.

### **Project Fund**

We identified a need to upgrade all the church toilets to bring them up to an acceptable standard and also consider improving access to the Brotherton Hall. We have raised a further £10,095 towards the cost of this work and received a grant of £13,613. The toilets in the main building have been completed at a cost of £80,657. The fund currently stands at £11,038.

### **Parish Development Fund**

During the year we received a legacy of £83,055 to permit us to improve our profile in the parish. We also received interest of £1,882. The fund now stands at £97,425

### Looking forward.

This year we are looking at a significant deficit with a large increase in our commitment to Giving to Grow and increases in other costs. It is essential that we maximise income and control costs.

We were able to send an extra £1,000 to the Foodbank in December over and above the £350 per month we normally give to help those families in real need over the Christmas period.

Donations in kind were also made during the year to St. Gregory's Foodbank, the Lodging House Mission and Christmas gifts for children through Glasgow, the Caring City.

Muriel's **blog** features a documentary called **"No Other Land"** made jointly by an Israeli and a Palestinian filmmaker.

At the Oscar's it won best picture in the documentary category. You can watch it online or on Channel 4. Watch to get a sense of the poverty of the Bedouin people but most of all to get a



glimpse of the dignity and courage of people who have been dispossessed several times over and whose community is threatened today.

Muriel has also sent a **letter** to Partner Congregations and Presbyteries about "What to do?". She says that it is really important to be informed and to focus on what we can affect, rather than what we can't. A vital example is writing to our MPs and the Foreign Secretary about UK involvement in arming and assisting the Israeli military.

Prayer is also important - informed prayer that recognises the humanity of all and the fragility of the current situation. A prayer from Christian Aid has been published in the March edition of the Beacon.

Muriel is hoping to visit the West Bank more frequently now that travel restrictions have lifted somewhat and that she hopes to meet with many partners in the North and find out about their programmes with young people and their leaders. She continues to lead worship in Tiberias and Jerusalem and work with staff in the hotel. She continues to enjoy time spent at Tabeetha school, a school run by the Church of Scotland which welcomes all children regardless of race, nationality, gender or religion.

She says "Let us stand in solidarity with all those who long for peace with justice for all. "




